

Day 1

Monte Carlo, Monaco

The Principality of Monaco is the epitome of Riviera chic. This tiny enclave of 370 acres surrounds a sheltered harbor that draws yachts from around the world to enjoy the beautiful scenery, mild weather and elegant casino.

Day 2

Porquerolles, France

The Mediterranean coast offers spectacular mountains, seemingly endless sandy beaches and yachting centers. The Hyeres Islands, or Golden Isles (Iles d'Or), are three islands off the coast of the Var, east of Toulon. At about four miles long, Ile de Porquerolles called "Prote" by the Greek colonists, is the largest of the three islands. This mostly uninhabited island of Mediterranean forests is a paradise for nature lovers, with its nature reserves, beaches, and calanques, small inlets in the rocky cliffs along the island's southern coastline.

Day 3

Antibes, France

Antibes was founded as a Greek trading port in the 4th century BC and is now a center for fishing and rose growing. Avenue de l' Admiral - Grasse runs along the seafront from the harbor area. A stroll along it will take you to a lively market most mornings, the Immaculate Conception Church, and the St. Andre Bastion, home to the Museum of Archeology. Overlooking town is the Chateau Grimaldi, built in the 12th century and extensively rebuilt in the 16th century. Reached by steps, the terrace holds marvelous views of the sea and inside the Picasso Museum exhibits works of Picasso, who lived and worked here during one of his most cheerful and energetic periods.



Day 4

Saint Raphael, France

Between the red lava peaks of the Massif de l'Esterel and the densely forested hills of the Massif des Maures, St-Raphael was first popular during Roman times, when rich families came to the resort here. In the second half of the nineteenth century, under the influence of Mayor Felix Martin and writer Alphonse Karr, city developed into a popular seaside resort with artists, sportsmen and politicians

Day 5

Mahon (Menorca), Spain

Mahon is the capital of Menorca, second largest of the Balearic Islands. It stands out from the others because of the abundance of prehistoric structures, and because its culture was influenced by British occupation in the 18th century.

Day 6

Palma De Mallorca, Spain

Spain's Balearic Islands are among Europe's most popular resort destinations. Mallorca is the largest and most developed of these islands. The city of Palma de Mallorca, the island's busy capital city boasts a considerable store of history.

Day 7

Valencia, Spain

Valencia is located 1½ miles from the Mediterranean, in the middle of Europe's most densely developed agricultural region.



Day 8

Barcelona, Spain

Barcelona, the capital of Catalonia, is Spain's second largest city and was host to the Olympics in 1992. The medieval atmosphere of the Gothic Quarter and the elegant boulevards combine to make the city one of Europe's most beautiful. Barcelona's active cultural life and heritage brought forth such greats as the architect Antonio Gaudi, the painter Joan Miro, and Pablo Picasso, who spent his formative years here.
